

What are the differences between ELOG, AOBRD and ELD?

OVERVIEW

Electronic logs, AOBRD and ELD are terms that relate to driver's daily logs. Often Fleet Managers and Drivers confuse the three terms. Below is an explanation for each.

ELECTRONIC LOGS (ELOGS)

ELogs are not compliant with the ELD Mandate because they are fully editable. Duty Status will <u>not</u> change when a truck begins moving; the only automatic change to the Duty Status is based on GPS location from the driver's mobile device

- ELogs are equivalent to Paper Logs
- Non-engine powered

AUTOMATIC ONBOARD RECORDING DEVICE (AOBRD)

To be AOBRD compliant, you must have installed an FMCSAapproved device by December 18th, 2017. When AOBRD is enabled, the driver must synchronize their handled device with the truck and record:

- Truck and Carrier information
- HOS Summaries
- Automatic Duty Status Changes and Drive Time
- Any AOBRD malfunction information

Note: You can continue to make edits if using AOBRD. Drivers can use AOBRD logs until December 16th, 2019.

ELECTRONIC LOGGING DEVICE (ELD)

To be ELD compliant, you installed an FMCSA-approved device after December 19th, 2017. ELD is more strict and stringent about the information recorded and displayed. ELD requires:

- Truck and Carrier information
- HOS Summaries
- Automatic Duty Status Changes and Drive Time
- ELD Malfunctions
- Intermediate Driving Events
- CMV status
- Diagnostic Data and Engine Malfunction Information
- Unidentified Driving events.
